Community Asset Analysis Review

Community asset analysis helps us determine how best to serve our community through an understanding of who's in our community, what they're looking for and what they need, and what's available to them. As part of this program, you should look at data and connect with key individuals and groups in your community, as well as library patrons with young children to see what these people need and what's available in the community.

Helps answer questions like:

- Who's in your community?
- What services are available to young families?
- What do young families need / want?
- How can the library help meet those needs?

 - What it's like living in [your community]?
 - How long have you and your family lived here?
 - What it's like for families with young children?
- What's available now
 - What community resources do you rely on?
 - Are there any businesses that are important to you and your family?
 - What kinds of community organizations or businesses are missing?
- What about the library
 - How familiar are you with the kinds of services we provide to children from birth to Kindergarten?
 - Are there any other services you'd like to see in the library?
 - What could the library do in general to improve your and your children's lives in our Community?
