1896: Gina Loprinzo

Location: Brewster

Although not chartered until 1930, the Brewster Public Library started serving the Town of Southeast with a collection of about 500 books from a storefront in 1896.

1898: Catherine Cavanaugh

Location: Mahopac

Spanish American War; Rough Riders charge up San Juan Hill in Santiago, Cuba (July 1898) under President William McKinley. Also - <indecipherable> founded.

Unnecessarily complicated with too frequent changes of color. Range should have been expanded. Some shades so close in color that it was difficult to determine which was which. Overall, colors vivid and quite lovely together.

1899: Roberta Levine

1900: Melissa Mansfield

Location: Adirance or Starr

Sarah Curlew Mansfield was born in Ulster County on April 24, 1900. She taught me about fiber art and the importance of laughter.

Amazement of how much the world changed in her 92 years, and how much the region was, and continues to be, shaped by the Hudson River.

It's a beautiful way to tell an alarming story - through community. And I need to figure out a better way to weave in the ends!

The year our building was built.

Curiosity + joy. I really liked seeing heat waves and or cold snaps take place.

1903 was the year that Morton was built as a community house for the people of Rhinecliff by Levi P Morton

We worked on this as a group (our 2x/month craft group called "Knit and Knatter") and everyone - even those who can't knit well - participated.

We worked together as a team and I think the group enjoyed that. The banner may not be perfect, but it garnered a shared feeling - and a lot of giggles (and a few swear words with dropped stitches). The border is awful. One extra stitch at each end to be slipped at start of each row would have looked nicer.

1908 was the first year of my paternal grandmother's life. Sophie Ligansky Kaplan was an ardent environmentalist well before the modern movement. She also taught me to knit.

As I began knitting with January data, I thought about how an infant in 1908 might have been dressed on the coldest winter days. How might she have been bundled up out on the streets of Brooklyn? Or how did she look as she crawled on the beach that first summer?

I enjoyed working with the beautiful and deeply saturated colors of wool as I changed them following the temperature data. At the same time I was reminded of the ominous climate change they represent.

As a new resident of the Hudson Valley, I was so pleased to connect and participate in this meaningful “craftivism” project.

I also found myself looking for what the temperature was on dates that were significant to me, like family birthdays. Sometimes I would set a goal to knit until I reached one of those dates!

At the Germantown Library I have led the creation of an annual fiber arts display for the past six years, including street art/yarn bombs pieces both inside and outside on the grounds of the library. One year included a 56-foot long crochet coral reef, which highlighted coral bleaching due to global warming. (These pieces were subsequently donated to a larger crochet coral reef display at the Tang Teaching Museum at Skidmore College.) This Tempestry project and it's partnership with the Mid-Hudson Library System matched beautifully with my enthusiasm for fiber arts, caring for our environment, and collaborative art projects. Thank you to all who were instrumental in making this happen!
